

#### **Program highlights**

July 2008 - June 2009

Alligned with the ChildFund Global strategy, ChildFund Sri Lanka rolled out the three core programs; "Care and development of infants and young children", "quality learning opportunities and enhancing achievements in basic education" and leadership and "livelihood skills for youth" to all its affiliated communities.

#### Care and development of young children:

Addressing development needs of young children and enabling a secure environment to grow in. Good health and nutrition, education, protection, love and care are all essential to a child's development.

- Established six ECD centers in Anuradhapura and Puttalam maintaining the minimum standards introduced by the Government. Trained 996 mothers/caregivers in home-based care resulting in the improvement of their knowledge and the attitudes on good health and proper nutrition for their children. 1738 home gardens were established. Special training provided to 12 pre-school teachers of these ECD centers on teaching methods and school management. These centers have been highly recognized by the Government of Sri Lanka and considered as model ECD centers. Midwives and Provincial ECCD coordinators regularly visit these centers. As a result of all these interventions, both regular attendance of children and community participation in these centers have increased by 80%. The project was implemented with funding from ChildFund Australia.
- Trained 15 ECD Teachers attached to 8 ECCD centers in Trincomalee on ECD education benefiting nearly 250 children. Constructed play parks in 4 ECD centers and were equipped with play items for 10 ECD centers in the project area to ensure proper ECD education. In addition to this, 9 ECD centers in Polonnaruwa had been provided with financial assistance for the maintenance of the centers to ensure the operation of centers for the benefit of approximately 300 children.
- Provided fresh milk for 531 children who attended ECD centers, assisted 34 families for home gardening and conducted awareness on the importance of taking nutritious food for pregnant mothers.
- Conducted a 3-day medical camp in Desfford Tea estate and Loggie Tea estate in Nuwara Eliya Bright Future Program which targeted the laborer or Tea plucker families working in the Tea estates. A total of 269 children and 200 maternity patients from seven tea estates were investigated and treated. This medical camp was organized for a visiting Medical team organized by ChildFund Korea.

A remarkable accomplishment of this camp was the diagnosis of a child D. Roshinie having advanced congenital heart disease needing urgent surgery. The medical team from Korea agreed to support operation of the child by raising Rs 350,000 from Korea.

#### Positive outcomes for children



- Constructed sanitary toilets benefitting 70 families in both projects in Trincomalee and Polonnaruwa with community contribution. Safe drinking water has been a major problem in these project locations and the communities were assisted with materials to construct 9 wells. The wells are now being used by the families.
- 183 toilets constructed and 72 families were provided access to safe drinking water facilities while another 171 families received water filters after a ground water testing was done by the National Water Supply & Drainage Board.
- Provided 16 water supply systems for government schools and ECCD centers.
- Constructed 192 houses under the housing improvement program, apart from the kitchen improvement program at family level.
- Improved the quality and standards in 192 ECCD Centers through the provision of water and sanitation facilities, play and stationary items, furniture, training for pre school teachers and mother groups. A total of 5687 children benefited through this program.
- Created awareness among 100 mothers on better feeding practices for infants and 54 pregnant mothers were provided with nutritious food ration.
- Provided mid-day meals for 90% of children attending pre schools with ChildFund funds and parents' contribution.
- Completed 60% of the construction of the Pediatric Ward at the Ashraff Memorial Hospital Kalmunai.
- Minimized threat of bowel diseases among children through the completion of water projects in 02 schools and 02 community water projects in the Bright Future Program in Hambantota.
- Improved teaching quality of Preschool teachers through the training of 30 ECCD teachers in the Bright Future program in Hambantota.
- Achieved the minimum standard for Pre schools through the upgrading of 06 preschools in the Bright Future program in Hambantota.
- Data collected of families without year round access to safe drinking water in Puttalam and Trincomalee District sponsorship programs to improve the quality of water which will prevent water borne diseases among 0-5 and older children.
- Established ECCD management committees in 12 ECD centers in Trincomalee on school management.
- Completed 50% of the construction of safety fences in 6 ECD centers in Trincomalee.





- Contributed to maintain a good environmental sanitation by providing 121 toilets to families in the district of Hambantota.
- Contributed to the prevention of water borne diseases by water testing and improving the
  quality of water in 40 wells and providing low cost filters and created access to safe drinking water with the assistance of government Water Board in Gomarankadawala Trincomalee and Moneragala.
- Improved class rooms with teachers trained in best practices of Early Childhood Care and Development benefiting 1276 pre school children. To achieve this end Ruhunu Wellassa Area Federation Hambantota renovated 08 pre school buildings and facilitated 12 teachers to undergo Diploma Level Teacher Training.



## Quality learning opportunities and enhancing achievements in basic education



ChildFund Sri Lanka designed programs to effectively reducing the number of primary school-age children who are not enrolled in school, expanding secondary education, improving children's literacy and learning skills and build children's confidence.

- Established a model Children's Leaning Center at Egodapitiya in the district of Puttalam.
   This center provides a range of after school activities to the children including Library facilities for further reading, Music and dancing classes, English classes and Skilled volunteers to support children with learning difficulties etc. Approximately 1500 children benefit from this learning center.
- Organized and conducted additional classes lead by Teachers on mathematics, science and English after school hours in Trincomalee benefiting around 500 children from Grade 5 to Grade 10. These are the three subjects where children in the area face maximum learning difficulty; this problem has got aggravated due to conflict situation where many rural schools do not even have teachers for these three important subjects.
- Supplied school items for 2128 students from Polonnaruwa and Trincomalee projects to ensure the continuation of education and to reduce school dropouts from the project areas. Assisted one School in Polonnaruwa to establish an outdoor study area.
- Provided financial assistance to 78 children attending preparatory classes for GCE Advanced Level (GCE - A/L) to obtain quality education facilities while another 1073 children benefited through supplementary classes and language classes. Another 334 students benefited through seminars which were conducted for the preparation of A/L examination.
- Supported the construction of a library for children of the Dasuna Chilren's Program with financial contribution of over Rs.2 million in a joint partnership project with the District Secretariat and the Sri Lanka Rupavahini Corporation.
- Renovated classrooms in 06 schools in Bright Future program in Hambantota.
- Developed play fields in 02 schools in Bright Future program in Hambantota
- Supplied sports equipment to 06 schools in Bright Future program in Hambantota.
- Conducted supplementary classes for 492 children from both Trincomalee and Polonnaruwa affiliated projects.
- Supplied sufficient stocks of play materials and upgraded play areas in 10 under-privileged schools in remote villages in Hambantota, benefiting 4540 School Children to engage in sports activities.

## Quality learning opportunities and enhancing achievements in basic education



- Conducted the "Global Education Campaign" event under the theme "Youth and Adult Literacy and Life long Learning" in 10 ChildFund affiliated projects partnered with Government officials, religious leaders, parents, school teachers and children to recognize and advocate for the need to be literate; i.e. learning to read and write. The event highlighted the importance of education with special emphasis on youth and adults. To mark the event, two ChildFund projects organized a special radio program in which issues related to youth and adult education and how programs of ChildFund Sri Lanka projects could address them in the next planning year with participation of Community groups were discussed.
- Provided assistance to 937 children for supplementary classes, while another 2266 children received school requisites.
- Established 218 children's societies under the formation and strengthening of children's societies in government schools and communities.



#### Skilled and involved youth



Giving youth brighter opportunities and making them committed to seeing change take place in their own communities:

- Conducted 63 training sessions for zonal level children societies. Subsequently, a strong Child and Youth Federation was established by federating 10 children's societies. This society conducted a 2-day residential youth camp in the Bright Future Program in Hambantota. About 1000 children benefited through a Skills Enhancement Program.
- A total of 677 youth graduated in Business Enterprise Development Trainings out of which 300 youth participated in an industrial exposure in search of future carrier opportunities.
- Provided vocational and other skills training such as computer, livelihood etc., for 282 youth.
- Conducted Middle Level Management courses for 75 youths within the age range of 18 to 29 years in the Bright Future program in Hambantota.
- Trained 60 youths for the Duke of Edinburgh Youth Awards in the Bright Future program in Hambantota area while another 300 youth in the age range of 14 to 25 years were exposed to a pre-expedition training under the Duke of Edinburgh Youth Award Program.
- A total of 267 youth attached to the ChildFund IDP camps in Batticaloa received bronze medals under the Duke of Edinburgh Youth Award Program.
- Conducted six life skills development workshops for 360 youth attached to the Bright Future program in Hambantota, where they were trained in problem solving processes and involved them in the group activities carried out in the Workshops.
- Provided skills development training for 250 youth as well as in the Duke of Edinburgh Youth Award program in Gomarankadawala & Morawewa in Trincomalee district and Siaymbalanduwa in Moneragala District and Dambulla project in Matale District.
- A total of 745 youth participated in the Duke of Edinburgh program out of which 260 youth were awarded bronze medal and another 40 qualified for the said medal. The other 455 youth are continuing the program successfully.
- Established and strengthened 61 youth clubs providing young people with training on community leadership. Further, 200 youth were exposed to career guidance training while another 31 youth were provided employable skills in coordination with government institutions, NGOs and other Private Vocational Training institutions in Gomarankadawala and Siaymbalanduwa.

#### Giving young people the opportunity to make the best use of their leisure time ....

A personal development program for young people, the Duke of Edinburgh International Youth Award Program has been a successful life skills and personality development endeavor for the youth in the ChildFund affiliated programs. The program promotes and develops leadership, self-determination, self-confidence, perseverance and a desire to be of service to others. It is in deed a challenge and an opportunity, a way to develop skills, take up new interests, experience adventure, make friends, help the community – and help the youth themselves. It also enhances respect towards nature and an appreciation of resource limitations. There are 520 youth in the ChildFund affiliated programs, between the age of 14 and 24 years who are enrolled in the Duke of Edinburgh Youth Award Program and involved in a wide variety of purposeful activity. They can choose activities which suit their own individual tastes and talents and which are relevant to local community needs. The help of adults to instruct and guide young people in the activities of their choice is essential to the success of the program. These young boys and girls were engaged in assignments under the four main activities:

**Service:** Community service, assisting needy children, youth service, First

Aid, Sunday school teaching, Disaster Relief, Adult home service,

and many others,

**Expedition:** Mountain climbing, visit historical locations, Nature camp, Jungle

trips, Cross -country tours,

Skill development/Interests: Dancing, Paintings, Music, handicraft, collection and surveys,

Communication, cookery, woodwork, pottery, singing,

languages, computer science and many others

Physical Activity: Physical Efficiency, Athletics, Swimming, Individual Sports, and

Team Games.



A total of 745 youth participated in the program while 260 youth were awarded bronze medals and another 40 were qualified for the said medal. The other 455 youth are continuing the program successfully.

ChildFund Sri Lanka which is registered as an operating authority with the National Youth Awards Authority since 2005 continued to promote and provide the Award to more young people in the ChildFund programs.



### ChildFund Sri Lanka help war affected children resume life in peace.

At long last, ChildFund Sri Lanka was able to expand its reach to the children in the north! With the 25 year old war in the north being declared over by the government, ChildFund Sri Lanka stepped in with programs to support vulnerable children housed in IDP camps. Nearly 300,000 people have been displaced and many among them are children in their thousands lacking basic needs such as food, clothing, proper shelter, medical care, safe water and good sanitation. ChildFund began its emergency relief activities after having obtained permission from the government to work in the north. The highest number of IDPs are temporarily sheltered in the Vavuniya District.



ChildFund established two emergency response programs - one in the Dharmapuram IDP Camp and the other in the Poonthodam IDP Camp in Vavuniya. Activities began with the opening of Child Centered Spaces (CCS) as a means of providing safety, normalization, supervision, emotional support and a platform for building formal education. Five Child Centered Spaces (CCS) in the Poonthodam Camp in Vavunia were set up to provide a safe place for children to play and learn surrounded by caring adults. There are 2245 children from birth to 18 years of age in this camp. Each CCS centre accommodated approximately 260 children. As a first step to help children in their normalizing activities, play material and learning material such as toys, game sets, drawing books, exercise books, pencils, painting sticks etc., were provided to the children. This was done from a list of preferred play material obtained from the children. At the CCS children receive a nutritious snack on a daily basis. Five CCS being established the Dharmapuram camp.





Child Fund Sri Lanka was one of the first INGOs to make an entry to the north to assist the IDP community. ChildFund works closely with the government by contributing to its humanitarian relief/recovery efforts in the North.

The school aged children in the IDP camps have not been able to attend formal schools for more than a year as many schools have been damaged or destroyed completely due to the war. Still, they need to continue their education uninterrupted. The children are keen on pursuing their studies. Temporary schools are run by the Education Department officials who are also IDPs. Teaching is done in open areas within the camps. ChildFund Sri Lanka provided learning material such as exercise books, pens, pencils and other requisites.

#### **Emergency Response**



#### ChildFund supports children in IDP camps to instill reading habits

With the objective of enhancing literacy through reading among children who have faced conflict for a longer period, ChildFund Sri Lanka provided books and furniture to set up libraries in 5 villages in IDP Camps in Vavuniya District in collaboration with the Ministry of Social Services. The project will enhance reading habits among the children in IDP camps.

#### **Supporting disadvantaged families in the Jaffna District:**

Through the "Gift of Love and Hope" funding, ChildFund assisted disadvantaged children and their families by providing bicycles for children, fresh milk for children, mosquito nets, solar panels for four schools, desk and chairs for preschool children and reading glasses. In addition, wells and latrines were constructed for these families. To improve their income status by engaging in income generation activities, fruit plants, home gardening kits, water pumps, cows and female goats and baby chickens were provided. This program was carried out in collaboration with the Ministry of Social Services and Social Welfare.





#### Significant events during the year

• ChildFund Sri Lanka's five-year Country Strategic Plan (CSP) 2009-2014 was developed in alignment with the organization's Global Strategy. The Sri Lanka strategic plan clearly articulates the organization's Core Intent and the Core Outcomes. The CSP literally focuses on the organization's new program development model known as "Bright Futures". Adopting the lifecycle approach to child development, this CSP will guide us throughout the next five years with our program interventions lined up to achieve the organization's

core intent with proven impact on our core outcomes. Throughout the CSP period ChildFund Sri Lanka will strive to positively respond to the ever emerging needs of the deprived, excluded and vulnerable children across the country. The three core program areas as described in the CSP are Fostering Care and Development of Infants and Children, Enhancing Educational Young Achievements of Children and Advancing Leadership and Livelihood Skills of Youth. development of the CSP was done through a participatory approach involving stakeholders.

- ChildFund's Core programs rolled out in sponsorship and Bright Futures programs
- Construction of the gigantic pediatric ward construction project in Kalmunai commenced.
- "Bright Futures" ChildFund's new sponsorship programming model was rolled out in the Tea Plantation program "T-Field Child Development Federation" in Nuwara Eliya. This was the second Bright Futures program to be implemented in Sri Lanka. A total of 4120 children are enrolled in the program while the total beneficiary population is 31838. The first Bright Futures Program was rolled out in Hambantota in 2007. The Bright Futures program provides for a greater and increased participation and involvement of children, youth and parents in program implementation that would ensure better outcomes. It also helps build the capacity of the



community to address the causes of child poverty and adversaries identified in the area. As a whole, ChildFund Sri Lanka aims to establish six Bright Futures Areas over the next five

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#### Significant events during the year

• ChildFund Sri Lanka was the first program country within the Asia Region to pilot test the Lot Quality Assurance Sampling (LQAS) through a baseline survey which was conducted in the new Bright Futures Program Area in Nuwara Eliya. A total of 11 estates were included in the Survey. The LQAS method was used to determine the priority needs of the communities in order to design program interventions in relation to the Core Programs.



- ChildFund Sri Lanka's Sponsorship Program in Trincomalee commenced transitioning into Bright Future programming approach.
- ChildFund Sri Lanka made a breakthrough to the Northern Province in the immediate aftermath of the war by providing emergency relief services to the internally displaced children and their families housed in IDP camps in Vavuniya. ChildFund Sri Lanka lost no time to set up Child Centered Spaces (CCS) in two IDP camps in Vavunia District to ensure safety and recovery of the vulnerable children. These spaces provide a safe place where children can play and learn.



• The organization name change process was successfully finalized with the endorsement received from the Ministry of Social Services followed by the issuance of a new registration certificate carrying the new name "ChildFund Sri Lanka" paving the way for us to officially function as ChildFund Sri Lanka beginning July 1st 2009.



#### Significant events during the year

With a new strategy, a new brand and a new vision in place, our mission to help the country's deprived, excluded and vulnerable children will continue under a new name effective July 1st 2009.

The National Director issued a press release on the name change which was published in several leading local newspapers. This was followed by a press conference with a large gathering of media personnel representing the print and electronic media. Highlights of the press conference were telecast over the national and private TV companies. Subsequently, a special event was held on 29th June 2009 at the Sri Lanka Foundation Institute in Colombo to officially welcome and celebrate the new name and brand. The event was attended by a large gathering of our enrolled children, affiliated project parents, staff and other stakeholders. The flag changing ceremony was followed by the release of 100 green and white gas balloons with the ChildFund name printed on them. The ChildFund Cake was cut by the National Director.





#### Ensuring a protective environment for children and developing leadership and entrepreneurial skills in youth



This project has helped children regularly attend Child Centered Spaces (CCS) to play, enjoy fellowship, discuss with their peers, relax and get involved in sports. Children have taken the initiative in community social work like cleaning places of worship, hospitals and other places of public gathering. Illnesses among children have reduced significantly due to the practice of good health habits and due to improved housing conditions. School children attend extra classes with the support of

volunteers. The three libraries equipped with books have made it convenient for the children to access reference books who otherwise have to travel all the way to the Batticaloa Town for library reference. The books available in the libraies were just enough for their research studies to prepare for their examination. The other benefit is their personal security and safety as the three libraries set up which are close to their homes. Advocacy training for children is bearing fruit. Children have approached the educational authorities to obtain their needed educational requisites owed to them by the government. The children now get their text books on time which are provided by the government. Children's nutritional status has improved. Child Well Being Committees were established in each of the 06 communities which support the expansion of livelihoods of these families. A total of 235 beneficiary families received loans for income generating activities like cattle and goat rearing, production of confectionaries, poultry, small scale businesses, sewing, fishing etc. Many of the families have already made profit out of their income generating activities which has increased their household income. Houses of the poultry breeders have been improved or upgraded. Youth engaged in compost making have developed their skills and the compost manufactured by them are being marketed. The youth in the program implementation areas are mostly involved in their skills development through training. Leadership in getting their task completed is one of the outstanding qualities that could be seen with Youths and as a result 102 youth received Bronze medals and certificates under the Duke of Edinburgh International Youth Award Program. They are working hard for the Silver medal in the next round. A total of 3000 children are direct beneficiaries of the program.

A three-year project funded by ChildFund New Zealand, the Livelihoods & Child Protection Capacity Building Project ensures the wellbeing of conflict affected children and their families by building the capacities of children, youth and parents to take on the lead to achieve sustainability and self-reliance. It also enables conflict affected families to economically support themselves and to meet their own needs. The program targets 400 vulnerable families in 06 communities who had lost their livelihoods to the civil war in the Eastern Province.



#### **ECCD Development Project – Centre Based & Home Based Care**

Twleve community preschools were upgraded to function as child friendly ECCD centers, meeting National minimum standards; 04 ECCD centers in Anuradhapura and 8 ECCD centers in Puttalam benefiting 320 children. In keeping with the minimum standards, all the 12 preschools were equipped with appropriate furniture, indoor play materials, toys for learning circles, bottle hangers and other infrastructure facilities. The ECCD centers were also provided with water and sanitation facilities. Each of the 12 pre schools is surrounded by a protective fence and gate to ensure protection of children and the premises. Preschools walls are painted with child friendly messages and drawings. Provided skills training for the 24 preschool teachers on "what is Early Childhood Development"; development of creative play items using low cost materials, learning circle & 5S concept for pre schools, making outdoor play areas "Sellam Midula" in every preschool.

Preschool attendance improved with over 80% of enrolled children attending the ECCD centres regularly. Conducted awareness program for Parents/caregivers on the importance of preschool education and enhanced the knowledge and skills needed by them to raise healthy children. Growth monitoring of children were done on a regular basis by Public Health Midwives. Nearly 1000 mothers/caregivers joined in discussion groups and that led to their enhanced knowledge on different health and nutritional issues which affect the growth and development of children and also about home based care practices at their homes. These families have enhanced household food security through establishment of Home Gardens leading to improved nutritional status of children. As a result, 1738 Home gardens were established.

The project provides a safe, and good caring environment at the home improving the by knowledge the and attitudes the mothers/care takers on homebased care, health and Nutrition. This program targeting 4300 beneficiaries includes children, parents and caregivers involved in ECCD centres of Dasuna, Sevana, Subuthi and Thalawa Projects Anuradhapura / Puttalam Districts. #### A Pediatric Ward for children in Kalmunai



The Pediatric ward will provide needed health care to infants and young children thereby reducing illnesses and deaths due to infections caused by pneumonia, Malaria and Diarrhoea. In addition the children's ward will have increased access to adequate space for Acute, Chronic and Diarrhoea cases and Special Baby Care Unit, Premature Baby Unit for the well baby clinic and other special activities. ChildFund understands that the period from birth to five years is the most critical time of development in a child's life. ChildFund provides safe

motherhood and neo-natal health. Construction activities of the Pediatric Ward complex at the Ashroff Memorial Hospital in Kalmunai progressed well during the year. The project is being funded by ChildFund Germany and the construction is expected to be completed by mid 2010. Over 150,000 young children will directly benefit from this project.

#### Child Friendly Water and Sanitation facilities in Sinhapura School in Morawewa, Trincomalee

The project provided access to child friendly water & sanitation facilities to this school benefiting 222 students and improved their hygiene practices. Fourteen school teachers also gained access to sanitary facilities and are able to use active learning methodologies for developing behavior among their students. Health clubs were formed to implement and monitor the participatory hygiene activities with the support of teachers. Safe Water and good Sanitation was a dire need for the students of the Sinhapura School. This requirement was fulfilled by the funding support received from ChildFund New Zeland. Two units of toilets were constructed separately for boys and girls with water facility.





#### Water and Sanitation through hygiene education in the "Dessford" and "Calsimahaeliya" Tea Plantation Estates

Due to poor hygiene, inadequate quantities and quality of drinking water, and lack of sanitation facilities many of the children in the Dessford and Calsimahaeliya Estates very often than not suffer from water borne diseases and other preventable diseases. With funding coming from ChildFund New Zealand, access to clean water and proper sanitation was a god-send to the vulnerable children and their families in these two Estates where ChildFund programs are on-going. A total of 117 tap points were set up to provide clean water for 440 households in the Calsimahaeliya Estate while 177 water points with a 2000 Leter water tank were set up for use by 659 beneficiary families in the Dessford Estate. The community provided free labor for the setting up of these water points and laying of pipelines. Constructed 100 water sealed toilets for 100 families in Calsimahaeliya Estate. In addition, 03 toilets blocks were constructed for 03 schools in the area, where beneficiary children attend. Similarly 100 families in the Dessford Estate were provided 100 water sealed toilets. Three toilet blocks for 03 schools in the estate area were constructed where children of beneficiaries attend.

All beneficiary families in both estates were provided with awareness trainings on hygiene and on water pollution and management, water borne diseases and preventive health and helped children and families adopt good practices. Water system maintaining committees comprising

of parents have been formed for the operation and maintenance of the water supply systems. These water and sanitation activities have brought out positive impact on the children and the communities with changed hygiene and sanitation behaviors. Childhood illnesses have reduced up to 50%; health & nutritional status of children aged 0-5 years of age have improved tremendously; improved coordination and cooperation amongst community members. The relationship community members and estate management improved as they cooperate to achieve the objectives of the program.




