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From the Chair



This year is highly significant for the world's children. It is a moment to reflect on the importance of childhood, and the right of every child to feel nurtured and protected, and to be given access to opportunity.

In 2019, the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) marks its 30th anniversary. The CRC has defined children's rights and has driven action to realise these rights. It makes clear that we should value the lives of all children now, not only their adult futures.

As the most ratified human rights treaty, the CRC has set in motion a quiet, far-reaching revolution for children.

It has driven change in all corners of the globe, prompting the introduction of legislation to protect children and investment in services that children need to survive and

develop. The CRC has also empowered more children to have a say in shaping their future.

The lives of most children have dramatically improved since 1989. Half as many children today will face early death due to hunger and preventable diseases. And over 120 million more children have the opportunity to attend school, and potentially break the cycle of poverty that has trapped their parents and previous generations.

However, in examining the progress it is clear that millions of children continue to be left behind. Their rights are violated and their childhoods are at risk.

This is particularly true when we examine children's right to safety and protection. As the United Nations undertakes its first review of Sustainable Development Goal 16.2 – ending violence against, and exploitation of, children – it is clear that abuse and mistreatment of children remains a global problem, cutting across borders, class, culture, and gender.

For iCARE, these international milestones serve as an important reminder of our mission and vision. We know we must do all in our power to be a champion for children and address the threats they face in today's world.

Fortunately, there is a large community of supporters who share this belief: thousands of individual Australians, schools, businesses and organisations who are helping children to grow up safe and to be positive and hopeful about their future.

The Australian Government continues to provide strong support to iCARE through the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. This support is vital in achieving our shared goals for children.

The commitment from all supporters allows iCARE to implement programs that prioritise health and wellbeing, and build children's resilience, meaning more children will survive and thrive.

Operating Result

The deficit of the company for the financial year was \$1,749 (2018: 37,630). The total equity of the company totaled \$111,420 (2018: \$113,169).

Principal Activities

The principal activity of the company during the course of the year was international aid and development delivered by working in partnership with children and their communities.

No significant change in the nature of these activities occurred during the year.

Training support was provided for School boards of management in partnership with government officials as well as additional support in the development of school learning improvement plans (SLIP).
			Initial monitoring indicates that the restructured SLIP training course based on lessons learnt from 2018 has led to more improved SLIP Development content and resource generation opportunities. SLIP implementation has also exceeded the targets set for 2019. The development of age and culturally appropriate e-books for children through Library For All have been fully completed this reporting period.

No dividends were declared or paid since the start of the financial year. No recommendation for payment of dividends has been made.

No options over issued shares or interests in the company were granted during or since the end of the financial year and there were no options outstanding at the date of this report.

1. Changes in Accounting Policies

The company has initially applied AASB 1058 Income of Not-for-Profit Entities and AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customer from 1 July 2018. The comparative information throughout these financial statements has not been restated as the company's accounting treatments on Revenue prior to 30th of June 2018 were consistent with new accounting standards.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a general-purpose financial report, which has been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements (AASBs) (including Australian Interpretations) adopted by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB), ACNC and the ACFID Code of Conduct Guidance. The Board of Directors has determined that the company is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation these financial statements except if mentioned in Note 1.

(a) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortized over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

(b) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

(c) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(d) Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reasonably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other shortterm highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(f) Revenue and Other Income

The Company has initially applied AASB 1058 and AASB 15 from 1 July 2018. Revenue from monetary donations and gifts are recognized in the statement of comprehensive income as revenue when the Company gains control of the donation under AASB 1058. Grants from Government, multilateral and non-government organisations are recognized as revenue when (or as) they are expended on programs and the performance obligations are satisfied under AASB 15.

Interest revenue is recognized using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognized when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(g) Leases

Leases of PPE, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership, are transferred to the company, are classified as finance leases. Finance leases are capitalized by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the period in which they are incurred.

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognized net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognized as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the assets and liabilities statement are shown inclusive of GST.

(i) Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period, which remain unpaid. The balance is recognized as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(j) Taxation

The company is a public benevolent institution and has received the tax concessions which are GST concession, FBT exemption, Income Tax exemption and Deductible Gift Recipient Status.

Report on the Financial Report
